AAUW Funds

I want to thank members for supporting AAUW Funds. Donations came in with the ASK letter in December and many more were made online. Thank you for generously supporting our national organization for the research, lobbying, And other important work they do.

A new task has been assigned to the AAUW Funds Committee. Every year, National AAUW invites hundreds of college women from around the country for leadership training, inspiration, and networking. For years, AAUW Minneapolis Branch has sent a student to NCCWSL - the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders – when we could find an interested student. Last spring, our board designated \$30,000, part of a generous bequest from late member Ardis Niemann Noonan, to be used to send young women to NCCWSL. The AAUW Funds Committee was charged with the task of encouraging young women to attend this conference. The committee met to discuss whom to send to University of Maryland, College Park, May 30 – June 1, for this exciting opportunity. It was decided that the conference would be offered to our scholars first, then other young women connected to AAUW Minneapolis Branch. The funds would pay for registration, lodging, airfare and would reimburse for certain other expenses, with receipts. We want to make

this affordable for anyone who wants to attend. In addition, this year we applied for and got a \$1,000 grant from AAUW MN to help send a student. We hope to have a few women attend supported by the Minneapolis Branch. You can learn more about NCCWSL at aauw.org.


