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### FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As we approach the middle of our 2024-2025 AAUW year, I have chosen to update you on

some of the AAUW
Public Policy Priorities as
set out by our leaders
from AAUW national in
Washington, D.C.
Additionally, I will be
sharing the comments
from a webinar on
AAUW Impact in 2024.



First, we have lost some ground in the last eight years regarding discrimination. Some of the discrimination felt by both women and girls, along with members of the LGBTQ+ communities and members of the minority communities, have eroded the gains of the last 150 years. This means we must be more focused on our mission and work harder than ever to accomplish the goals we have set forth. True equity requires a balance between the rights of the individual and the needs of the community.

Title IX was a real victory for women and girls in 1972. Yet we continue to have sexual harassment and assault on our female athletes and LGBTQ+ members. Sexual misconduct and the new requirements for how colleges and universities deal with these issues began in 2016.

Through the efforts of the courts and legislation, new regulations have been instituted in 2024. There is a new component of Title IX that is a civil rights law prohibiting educational institutions from receiving federal aid if engaging in sex-based discrimination.

On the national scene we have much work to do. Student debt continues to be a problem. Women are affected more by this issue than their male counterparts. This is why the support our scholars receive is so vital. Your encouragement and mentorship help them to find their voices and meet their goals. Without our scholarship program college would not be available to many of our scholars.

According to the public policy set forth by AAUW National "AAUW promotes the economic, social, and physical wellbeing of all persons. Essential to that well -being are an economy that provides equitable employment opportunities: reduction of poverty; a living wage: quality, affordable dependent care; paid family and medical leave; safe, livable, and affordable housing; quality, affordable, and accessible health care for all including reproductive health care; and a clean, healthy, and sustainable environment. These are the priorities for us as members to work on, support our legislators to enact into law, and raise all members of our society help to achieve."

In Minnesota, we still have not passed the ERA amendment. This is the year to make it happen.
